

What is Spelling?





Spelling is...

...the correct retrieval of sequentially stored, virtually random bits of information.



When you see a word... special

...you see it all at once.

Visual input is global, simultaneous.



Auditory input is sequential.



Spelling is a sequential activity; therefore, auditory input may be more effective for many children.






Critical for excellent spelling:
