As he chose the name, Mr. Pudewa decided he wanted the same for his program and it was originally called the Institute for the Achievement of Writing Excellence, but he decided that was a mouthful. With the help of his wife, he shortened the name to the Institute for Excellence in Writing, which we know and love today. Andrew Pudewa founded IEW to help everyone learn to write well.

Andrew **Pudewa** is a very fun person with a **colorful personality**. Mr. Pudewa has always appreciated humor and loves jokes. Because he wants to brighten his tired

students' day, he tells them a joke before class. Students eagerly anticipate his jokes.
