
Once there was a snowman Who stood outside the door, Thought he'd like to go inside And sit upon the floor;

Thought he'd like to warm himself By the fire so red; Thought he'd like to climb up On that big white bed.


So he called the North Wind, "Help me now, I pray. I'm completely frozen, Standing here all day."

Snapping Turtles

Snapping turtles live in ponds and lakes. They have a long tail with jagged ridges. Their neck is unusually long. They can snap at things behind them. They have a sharp beak that can grab food. Snapping turtles do not have any teeth. They swallow food whole. Snapping turtles eat water plants, fish, frogs, and tadpoles. They also eat insects, snails, leeches, and worms. They might even eat baby ducks and goslings. They will also eat small dead animals. The alligator snapping turtle uses a trick to catch fish. It holds its mouth open under water. It slowly wiggles its bright pink tongue. Fish think it is a worm and swim in. The mouth snaps shut. Watch out for snapping turtles!
